

A Thought for May

Rector's notes for May – Stewardship

If you look up the dictionary definition of "stewardship" you'll find something like the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to one's care. In Christian terms, we might think of it as honouring God by what we do with what we have. It includes what we do with our money – but importantly it's about our time and our talents as well.

The subject of giving money (back) to God is one that in this parish of Calne & Blackland we have not really been asked to think about for a good many years. And perhaps that's why our churches find ourselves in a bit of a financial pickle at the moment. Incidentally this review is something we will be doing every year in the future. Now, there's a temptation when we hear about church finances to say well, 'what about all the £billions the Church Commissioners have?' It's an important question, but it's quite a separate question to the one about honouring God with what we ourselves have.

I'm struck by the story in Luke's gospel of Jesus seeing a widow putting her two small coins in the temple treasury. Her gift is small in absolute terms, but she is applauded by Jesus because it represents a really sacrificial amount of what she had. What she doesn't do is say 'oh well the temple treasury has got so much money it doesn't need mine'. Hers is an act of giving to God, and honouring God

quite independent from that other question.



On 5th May we are launching an initiative to explain our financial position and to encourage all of us to review our level of financial giving. If you are on the electoral roll, you'll be receiving a letter about this. Some of us will already be giving all we can. For others of us, we will have the capacity to give more.

The churches of our benefice have a vital role in our community to point people to the good news of God's love for all, and to the power of God to transform people's lives for good. Those of us who are part of these churches, however peripherally, have the privilege and responsibility of sustaining that mission financially. So above all giving is a matter of faith.

Please do pray that God would bless this stewardship initiative and give us what we need to do everything God is calling us to do – to honour God and to serve our communities.



Jan Ingenhousz

an Ingenhousz was born in 1730 in Breda, in what today is in the southern part of the Netherlands. The son of a doctor, he completed his medical training in 1753 at the University of Leuven. Rather unusually he then went on to the University of Leiden where he studied electricity for two years.

After finishing this, he joined his father in his medical practice until his father died. He then decided to travel and learn about inoculation in England which was a leading exponent at the time. Helped by a family friend, Sir John Pringle, who was President of the Royal Society, he took part in the inoculation of a village in Hertfordshire of 700 people which was carried out entirely successfully.

He must have become well known as an inoculator because he was asked to inoculate King George III and his family. When Maria Theresa of Austria wrote to King George for an inoculator for her family the king recommended Ingenhousz. In the event he stayed on in Vienna and practiced as a court doctor until he decided to go back to England in 1779. He was invited to continue to carry out research into photosynthesis in the very same laboratory at Bowood, near Calne in Wiltshire, which J. Priestley had used in his research on oxygen and the process of photosynthesis.



In September of that year, his experiments led to his discovery of photosynthesis. He placed plants under water in a transparent container and saw that the undersides of their leaves made bubbles in sunlight. Conversely when the same plants were placed in darkness the bubbles stopped forming.

He collected this gas and conducted a series of tests to determine its identity. He eventually found that a smouldering candle or match would burst into flames when exposed to the unknown gas. This showed it was oxygen. He also found that in darkness plants gave off carbon dioxide.

In recognition of these discoveries Ingenhousz was elected to The Royal Society of London. Unfortunately he was taken ill at Bowood and died on September 7th 1799. He is buried in St. Mary's Church, Calne
