
Revd. Bob Kenway announces his retirement

We are all very sad to learn that Bob Kenway will be retiring in July 2022. Bob has been vicar of Calne for 25 years, moving to Calne from his previous parish of New Town, Birmingham. Bob was ordained 40 years ago and brought a range of experience to the Parish of Calne and Blackland. During his time in Calne, Bob has seen a number of changes, not least the move from a single parish to being part of the team ministry of Marden Vale and the change from Vicar of the parish to Rector of Marden Vale.

Bob has been ably supported by Sadie, his wife, who has had the role of parish administrator during most of the years that Bob has been in Calne. Together they have been a formidable team, supporting people in times of joy and times of sorrow and becoming important members of the wider community of Calne. Bob and Sadie



will be greatly missed, but we hope that retirement will be an opportunity for them to enjoy life without the responsibilities that they have so willingly carried during their years in Calne.

Graveyard Mapping Project

Bishop Andrew, who is a lead Bishop for church buildings said that this impressive national project will make a huge difference to those researching family history, as well as easing the administrative burden on parishes.

It will improve management of burial grounds, and make information more fully accessible than ever before, supported by additional services by subscription for those wishing to go further.

It will soon be possible to visit almost any Anglican burial ground in the country and see in real time the location of burial plots. For those researching at distance in the UK or overseas, the digital records will place detailed information from churchyards at their fingertips.

Church by church, and diocese by diocese, it is hoped that all Anglican churchyards will be surveyed over the next seven years. As well as capturing details of burials, the online interactive map will detail biodiversity in churchyards, including ancient trees and plant-life, as well as green technology such as solar panels.

The project includes around 19,000 churchyards, and the ancient churchyard of St Bega on the shores of Lake Bassenthwaite in the Diocese of Carlisle is the first to be scanned by surveyors, using sophisticated laser equipment as part of the



national programme.

A new website will go online next year giving free access to the map, which is expected to be of special interest to local community groups, conservationists, and those researching family history. The website will also enable the charting of biodiversity and green technology.

The project will come at no cost to parishes or dioceses in the Church of England, and parishes will have free access to the map through a new web-based record system which is set to launch in Spring 2022. There will also be the option to subscribe to additional services.

Substantial funding for the programme has been given by Historic England, with the National Lottery Heritage Fund and Caring for God's Acre supporting the pilot phase, as well as support from genealogy research websites, all of which has allowed the basic service to be made available to parishes free of charge.


Steven Colbey's Licensing

On Saturday September 18th I was at Salisbury Cathedral to see the ending of three years training when Steven became a Licensed Lay Minister (LLM). The service was Choral Evensong with licensing of lay ministers. Bishop the Rt Revd Karen Gorman, Warden of LLM's, introduced the service and then each candidate was presented to her by their incumbent, in their turn, the Rev Bob Kenway presenting Steven. The Bishop then asked had they made the Declaration, were of Christian character, and been sufficiently prepared; the replies coming from, the Registrar and Discernment Adviser and Training Officer. The congregation and incumbents promised to uphold, encourage and pray for them, The candidates were then admitted to the office of Licensed Lay Ministry by the Bishop giving

each a copy of the Scriptures and then vesting each one with a blue scarf. Bishop Karen handed all the candidates their licences with the words "receive the authority to exercise the office of Licensed Lay Minister in this Diocese". All LLM's present were asked to stand and make their Renewal of Commitment to Bishop Karen. The Bishop gave the Blessing and the Choir and Ministers left in procession to a rousing organ voluntary.

We pray for Steven and all the new LLM's for a long and rewarding Ministry.

Biodiversity Depletion

The United Nations estimates that a million species are threatened with extinction, and WWF last year found that wildlife populations are less than a third of those in 1970. This depletion of biodiversity is an existential threat to the future of humanity - and yet it commands even less public attention than the climate

emergency.

The environmental movement is complicit in this neglect. While the public is being mobilised for the COP 26 on Climate Change in Glasgow in November, the UN Biodiversity Summit (COP 15) taking place a month earlier in China is attracting much less fanfare.

THE UNITED NATIONS BIODIVERSITY CONFERENCE (COP 15)

...from 11 - 24 October in China, will review the achievement and delivery of the 2011-2020 strategic plan, and take a final decision on a post-2020 framework. The draft for this has included a focus on ensuring that work to preserve biodiversity contributes to “the nutrition, food security and livelihoods of people, especially for the most vulnerable”.

The Conference provides the global

community with opportunities to galvanize efforts at all levels to build a better future in harmony with nature

We need to let our leaders know how much we care for this beautiful God-given world.

Please pray for right decisions to be reached at these Conferences which will be crucial to the health and well-being of this planet Earth and of future generations.
